
#### **Top 5 Neighborhood Strengths**



#### 5 Most Needed Improvements




High crime dispersed throughout the neighborhood



- 16 violent crimes per 1,000 residents compared to 5.8 in Louisville Metro (3-year average)
- Violent crime is 2.8 times higher than the Metro average

Mixed signals on crime




- Part I: Violent & property crimes –aggravated assault, burglary, robbery, homicide, motor vehicle theft, etc
- Part II: Drug offenses, simple assault, vandalism, weapons offenses, etc
- Two biggest spikes: 60% drug-related offenses


#### "How frequently does crime occur?"



#### Jobs in Russell


- ~2,500 jobs in Russell
  - Top 3 industries: health care/social assistance, manufacturing, and wholesale trade
  - 38% held by workers with no college education
  - Approx. 100 of these jobs held by Russell residents
- Commercial: Retail including groceries, hardware stores, dollar stores, fast food restaurants, beauty salons, etc.
- Industrial: America's Finest Filters, DAE Industries, food service, parts, warehousing, etc.

#### Almost half of land use is housing




- Predominately single family between 15<sup>th</sup> to 30<sup>th</sup> Streets
- Predominately multifamily east of 13<sup>th</sup> Street
- Main commercial corridors on Broadway and Market
- Industrial areas along railroad lines

#### Extensive network of faith-based institutions



- Nearly 40 faith-based institutions
- Together, these institutions own approx. 40 acres of land

#### Over 80% of parcels are locally owned



- 18% owneroccupied housing units
- Compared to 62% owner-occupied in Louisville Metro





## Tree canopy coverage slightly below average



- 20% tree canopy coverage vs. 22% citywide in neighborhoods
- 25% target in urban residential neighborhoods, per Urban Tree Canopy Assessment, 2015
- Most trees located in backyards/ alleys where visual impact is minimal





#### Well-served by local bus transit




- 5 routes have more than 60 trips per day
- TARC interested in improving bus stops



"How big a barrier is transportation?"


"What is your primary mode of transportation?"






- 26% of Beecher households have at least one drivable car
- 58% of Beecher households indicated access to public transportation was one of the top three strengths of the neighborhood.

### A growing bicycle network



- New bike lanes on Muhammad Ali Blvd and Chestnut Street
- Connects to downtown and the Metro neighborways bike network

## Significant number of vacant lots scattered throughout the neighborhood



- No distinct patterns or concentrations of vacancy and blight
- Small lot size and scattered distribution requires fine-grained infill and rehab strategy

### Neighborhood housing characteristics

- 2,033 residential parcels (61% of all parcels)
  - 93% single family (1,895)
  - 7% multifamily (138)
- 4,802 housing units
  - 38% public housing or Section 8 units (1,829)
- 18% owner-occupied / 82% renter
  - Compared to 62% owner / 38% renter in Metro





### Neighborhood housing stock

- Almost half of housing built before 1939
  - Rehab potential to maintain neighborhood character, preserve affordability and improve energy efficiency
- Almost 20% of housing units are vacant (913 units)
  - Rehab/reuse potential, consider programs to encourage responsible homeownership
  - More residents will help attract more services and retail
- Most households are renters (82%)
  - Consider strategies to enforce responsible rental property management
- Diverse types of housing with no distinct patterns






#### Beecher Terrace today

- Baxter Square park; Old Walnut/Beecher park






## Site layout limits accessibility and safety






## Significant barriers to employment

- 28% of Beecher Terrace residents are looking for work now
- Self-reported barriers to work (among those looking):
  - Affordable child care (35%)
  - Transportation (27%)
  - Lack of High School diploma or GED (12%)
  - Criminal record (5%)
- Several fields of interest align with hot jobs and career pathways identified by Kentuckiana Works
  - Healthcare (24%)
  - Restaurant/Food service (18%)
  - Hospitality (16%)
  - Maintenance Janitorial (10%)
  - Manufacturing (9%)

## Access is difficult to some job centers




- Long travel times, multiple transfers


# Low educational attainment; but great local training and education resources

- Nearly 1/3 of Beecher + Russell residents do not have a high school degree/GED (2.5x citywide); only 2% enrolled
- According to Louisville Metro Community Needs Assessment 2015
  - Unemployment rate is significantly higher for those with lower educational attainment
  - Median earnings for someone with less than a high school degree is only 40% of someone with a bachelor's degree




## High numbers without bank accounts

- 41% of Beecher Terrace residents do not have a bank account; 16% use check cashing services
- Budgeting, Financial Literacy and Credit Repair: 3<sup>rd</sup> most needed service per Beecher Terrace resident survey
- Financial literacy classes offered at 11 locations in & around Russell; Urban League recently launched Financial Empowerment Center



# Nearly universal health insurance, but still high rates of emergency room usage

- 97% adults/98% children have health insurance compared to 76% in Russell and 86% in Metro
- High rates of emergency room use
- Barriers: cost (25%) and transportation (24%)
- 85% rate health care services as good or excellent
- More than half (58%) indicate no unmet health care needs
- Most common unmet health need is dental services (12%)



## High rates of chronic health conditions

- 39% of Beecher adults report fair/poor health
  - Greater than Black Non-Hispanics (31.89%)citywide
  - 3x rate of White Non-Hispanics (14.15%) and Hispanics (10.69%) citywide
- High rates of chronic health conditions selfreported at Beecher Terrace
  - Hypertension (43%)
  - Asthma (26%)
  - Arthritis (27%)
  - Extreme stress or anxiety (15%)
  - Depression (10%)
- Only 5% report their child's health is fair/poor
  - Yet, 33% of children suffer from asthma

## Good rates of physical activity reported but need for healthier eating

- 81% of Beecher Terrace adults and 97% of Beecher children report engaging in 30+ minutes of physical activity 3X per week;
- Almost half (47%) report no barriers to physical activity
  - Most common barrier: health conditions (20%), physical disability (16%), lack of places to walk/exercise (15%), concerns about safety (13%)
- 11% of Beecher Terrace adults and 15% of children report eating recommended 5+ servings of fruits and vegetables daily; compared to 26% of city/county residents per Healthy Louisville 2020
- While 49% indicated no specific reason for not eating more fruits and vegetables, 27% cite cost as a barrier


### High awareness and utilization of services

- Majority of Beecher residents are aware of major community partners:
  - Park Duvalle Health Center (71%)
  - Baxter Community Center (70%)
  - Nia Center (63%)
  - Urban League (60%)
  - Western Library (54%)
  - Chestnut Street YMCA Branch (48%)
- Use among those that are aware is very good; satisfaction rate even better
- Half (49%) of households report having no trouble accessing needed services; otherwise, lack of awareness is most common (35%) barrier
- Most needed services as reported Beecher Terrace residents: computer training (25%), transportation assistance (21%)

## ...but high levels of disengagement

- 75% of respondents are not participating in any neighborhood associations or organizations
- Sense of disengagement is higher among families with children
- Families who live at Beecher 10 years or more, report feeling more connected



## Many children are not ready for kindergarten


- 1,189 Russell children ages 0-5; 232 in Beecher
- 74% Beecher 0-5 year olds are enrolled in early learning program
- 206 Russell enrolled in JCPS pre-K program (no data on those not in JCPS)
- 42% of Beecher and 47% of Russell children entering kindergarten are kindergarten-ready; compared to 48% system wide (School year 2014-2015)



## Existing childcare slots appear to meet needs; but overall quality is low

- 19 licensed childcare providers in Russell
- Total licensed capacity: 1321 slots
- All STAR levels surpass the minimum certification and/or licensing requirements that all programs must meet
  - No Level 4 STAR Rating, which is highest on a scale from 1 to 4
  - 21% Level 3 STAR Rating
  - 54% Level 2 STAR Rating
  - 18% Level 1 STAR Rating
  - 7% not rated
- Limited options for workers with non-traditional hours
- Less than 1/3 provide transportation (29%)

Russell students attend 126 schools across the city...




- 2,337 school-aged Russell children attend 126 schools
  - 57 elementary
  - 30 middle
  - 39 high schools
- 332 Beecher children attend 50 schools

### ...but nearly 1/3 attend a school in Russell

- Nearly 1/3 attend one of four schools in the neighborhood: Byck, Coleridge-Taylor, Roosevelt Perry and Central High
- Many of the remainder are bussed significant distances to school
- About half (48%) of Beecher parents participate in PTA/PTO at least occasionally; 37% said transportation/school located closer to home would increase involvement



## Schools have mixed performance

- Performance is mixed among the most commonly attended schools:
  - Roosevelt Perry, Byck are classified Focus/Needs Improvement AND are under-performing relative to the District/State
  - Central High School is classified as Focus/Needs Improving/Progressing relative to the District/State
  - Coleridge-Taylor Elementary, Crosby and Highland Middle are classified as (Focus/Needs Improvement) but perform on par or slightly better than other schools in the District/State
  - Ballard and Eastern High Schools are classified as Distinguished/High Performing schools

- 30% of Beecher Terrace households with school-age children have a child with a special need (primarily behavioral)
- 14% of Beecher parents are concerned that their child might drop out of school
- 31% of Beecher parents had a child who got in trouble at school 2+ times in the past year

79% of Beecher Terrace youth enrolled in at least one type of

22% Faith-based/church activities




